

## Dealing with curved edges is EASY!



After clipping the edges on your Yoke, match all 5 notches (and the corners) to the notches on the InnerRoo (right sides together). If you've clipped your Yoke edge enough (~1 clip every 1/4"), then its really pretty easy to ease the edges into place.



As you can see, I use LOTS of pins when I do this, (taking little bites of fabric with each), because it helps to keep my edges even & flat (no gathers). When this step is done correctly, the Yoke will actually 'bow up' off the table as you can see.

As you can see, I sew right over the pins. I usually don't have a problem with my needle hitting the pins. When they're just holding tiny bits of fabric (instead of big chunks), the pins usually 'move' out of the way of the needle on their own, especially if you sew slowly. I also try to maintain the 'bowed up' shape while I sew, & constantly adjusting how the underlying fabric is 'feeding' to avoid sewing over a fold.



And here's the finished piece. No tucks, no gathers. Easy as pie!
